Old Testament Promises of the Superiority of Jesus to the Angels

~ Part 1 – verses 5-9 ~

Introduction

- How important is the superiority of Jesus? Why do you do what you do?
 - Colossians 3:23-24
- The way you think about Jesus impacts the way you live your courage and your convictions

Background

- Jewish people in the first century held angels in high regard
- Angels being involved in the giving of the Law of the Old Covenant is a significant reason angels were esteemed
 - Stephen's message before his stoning reveals this belief
 - Acts 7:52-53
 - The writer of Hebrews indicates this esteem as well, but exalts the salvation provided by Jesus Christ in the New Covenant as greater
 - Hebrews 2:2-3
- A critical point that must be understood is that since the New Covenant has come, there is no going back

Jesus is superior because He is God the Son of God the Father (1:5)

- For to which of the angels did God ever say, "You are my Son, today I have begotten you"?
 God describes the angelic beings He puts in positions of power as "sons of God"
 - Job 1:6
 - Job 2:1
- God never called a specific angel His Son
 - Psalm 2:6-8
- When the Father says of His Son, "...today I have begotten you," the begetting does not refer to creation or birth
 - The Son was "begotten" when God exalted His Son as King, ruling and reigning over the nations of the earth
 - The "begotten" exaltation happened at the resurrection and ascension of Jesus
 - No angel, but only the Son, is given all the nations to the ends of the earth as His heritage
 Deuteronomy 32:8-9
- Jesus is superior to the angels because He rules and reigns as the King, regathering the nations
- We are to welcome and reverence the rule and reign of Jesus over our lives and His earth

Jesus is superior because He is God the Son of God the Father (1:5)

Or again, "I will be to him a father, and he shall be to me a son"?

- The writer of Hebrews applies a portion of God's promise to David through Nathan after David's offer to build a temple for the Lord was turned down
 - 2 Samuel 7:14
- The Father's promise to have His Son perpetually on the throne of David (2 Samuel 7:1-17) can only be fulfilled by Jesus
 - Jesus is the eternal Son of God, but His incarnation, death, resurrection, and ascension became the avenue for His Davidic rule and reign as the Son of God
 - The Apostle Paul also affirmed Jesus to be the fulfillment of God's promises to David
 Romans 1:1-4
- This is another confirmation that Old Testament truths are valuable and need to be seen through the lens of fulfillment brought by Jesus Christ
- What is true of Jesus Christ as the exalted King of glory, fulfilling the promise of an abiding Davidic throne, cannot be said of any angel

Jesus is superior because the angels worship Him (1:6)

- ⁶ And again, when he brings the firstborn into the world, he says, "Let all God's angels worship him."
- God's eternal plan of redemption includes the incarnation
- Jesus is "the firstborn"
 - It does not mean that He was the first before the other created beings
 - It means Jesus has a place of honor and preeminence
- As the plan unfolded through the miraculous conception and delivery of the
- Christ-child, the angels are called to worship God the Savior and Son
 - Luke 2:8-14
- Worship of Christ the Lord is nothing new to angels
- Worship of Christ by the angels at His birth reveals the significance of the event
- Deuteronomy 32:43
- God calls the angels to worship the Lord for all aspects of His mission, from birth to exaltation
- Jesus is God incarnate and exalted, and His angels are to worship Him

Jesus is superior because angels are powerful, but He is the righteous Ruler (1:7-9)

- ⁷Of the angels he says, "He makes his angels winds, and his ministers a flame of fire."
- Psalm 104:4 ...he makes his messengers winds, his ministers a flaming fire.
 - The Psalm describes our sovereign Lord's power and authority over all He has created
 - All the Lord creates and controls are for His glory
 - Angels are given impressive powers and influence in the creation
- Angelic powers are not to be taken lightly


Jesus is superior because angels are powerful, but He is the righteous Ruler (1:7-9)

⁸ But of the Son he says, "Your throne, O God, is forever and ever, the scepter of uprightness is the scepter of your kingdom. ⁹ You have loved righteousness and hated wickedness; therefore God, your God, has anointed you with the oil of gladness beyond your companions."

- Psalm 45:6-7 is quoted to show the supreme power of the kingdom is issued by our Sovereign Lord Jesus
 - Psalm 45:6-7
- The impressive power of angelic beings does not remove them from the Lord's sovereign control
- The point of the writer of Hebrews is to show that this is clearly a reference to Jesus Christ, who is
- God, anointed by God as the Sovereign King
 - In fact, angels are completely responsive to the Lord's sovereign will and ways
 - The will and ways of the Lord are consistent with the love of righteousness and the hatred of wickedness
 - We must also be responsive to the will and ways of our Lord
 - We must affirm all that the Lord affirms
 - We must condemn all that the Lord condemns
- Angels are servants, but the Lord Jesus is sovereign
- If the angels wholeheartedly serve Jesus, the Sovereign Lord, shouldn't we?
 - Our delight and desires should honor our Lord, not coddle the world
 - All authority in heaven and on earth presently belongs to Jesus

- In what specific ways do you feel challenged to welcome and reverence the rule and reign of Jesus over your life?
- Why is it important to appreciate the Old Testament by reading it through the lens of fulfillment brought by Jesus Christ?
- How should the fact that Jesus is God incarnate and exalted impact your worship of Him?
- In what ways should the worship and service that the powerful angels unreservedly offer to Jesus as Sovereign Lord impact your service and worship of the Lord?



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
